

Superintendent's Message



MSD BOONE TOWNSHIP ISTEP+ TEST SCORES: 2011 (Grades 3-8)

The overall success rate of our students passing both the mathematics and language arts exams of the Indiana ISTEP+ tests for

grades 3-8 for 2011 ranked MSD Boone Township third of all Porter County School Corporations and fourth of 23 school corporations in Lake and Porter Counties. This is the highest percentage (84%) of students passing both ISTEP+ exams for this district since the ISTEP+ tests began more than 20 years ago.

Hebron Middle School ranked seventh of 45 middle schools in Porter and Lake Counties for the percentage of students (81.5%) passing the exams: math and language arts.

Hebron Elementary School ranked 21st of 103 elementary schools in Lake and Porter Counties for the percentage of students (86.3%) passing the exams: math and language arts.


This success rate is the result of staff members (teachers, aides, Rtl personnel, Title 1 personnel, study skills instructors and all levels of administrators) focusing on individual student strengths and weaknesses as well as being sure every student reaches mastery for the skills taught.

MSD Boone Township provides our teachers with many opportunities to improve their instructional skills through a variety of avenues:

- 1. Home grown inservice opportunities throughout the school year: A whole week of inservice programs each August.
- Lakeshore Alliance for Student Success Membership (LASS) – Balance Literacy Initiative in grades K-5, teacher questioning skills in the classroom and introduction to the new Common Core Standards.
- 3. AdvancED District Strategic Plan (K-12). This is an outside (regional accreditation organization) accountability measure with outside educators reviewing our instructional programs and initiatives as well as our achievement rate. This process allows our staff to spend a whole year to review our entire educational program and plan goals and a strategic plan for the district.
- 4. Diagnostic Testing: NWEA, ACT, Acuity, and quarterly assessments to measure each student's growth through the year and from year to year.

- 5. Professional Learning Communities: (PLC) Late school start on Wednesday to allow our teachers and administrators to review as a department or grade level and across school levels instructional strategies, student data, assessments, reviewing the Common Core Standards, etc.
- Low class sizes and additional support personnel as well as limited full-day kindergarten classes (two classes) despite major reductions of funding per student from the State of Indiana: a \$336,244.00 tuition reduction of the General Fund for the 2011 budget year.
- A strong emphasis on teaching technology skills and using technology for instruction. The Board and district personnel have made this area a major goal for the 2011-2012 school term by providing resources to upgrade our technology infrastructure and equipment in the classroom.
- 8. Administrative supervision of staff by having our principals in the classroom to view and assist the instructional program and supporting classroom initiatives.
- 9. A strong emphasis on the ability of our students to write for a variety of assignments (genre) beginning in the early elementary grades and continuing through high school.
- 10. Northwest Indiana Educational Service Center professional development workshops.

The 93rd Annual Indiana American Legion Department Convention was held in Indianapolis on July 14 - 17, 2011. These two teachers are instructors in the MSD of Boone Twp schools. It was not known by the American Legion Department staff when the last time was that both honorees came from the same school district and/or the same post: Post #190 in Hebron.

Notification of Parents and Students of the Implementation of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974

On August 21, 1978, the United State Congress adopted an amendment to the General Education Provisions Act called "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974" dealing with student records. The final regulations implementing this act were issued by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare on June 17, 1976. The act provides for the following:

- 1. The act concerns the student records of both elementary and secondary students. These include, but are not limited to, report cards, attendance, standardized test data, enrollment, health information and other educational information gathered by the school.
- 2. The building principal has the responsibility of being the custodian of student records.
- Parents' rights under this act extend until the student is 18 years old or is enrolled in a post-high school institution; thereafter, only the student may exercise such rights.
- 4. A record must be kept with each student's file showing who examined it, the date on which it was examined and the purpose of the examination. School officials of the school corporation who have "legitimate educational interest" in a student are exempted from this requirement by the act.
- 5. Without the written consent of the parent, education records of a student can be forwarded on request to another school system in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. The parent also may request and receive a copy of any records forwarded to another school or school system with a transfer.
- 6. The following constitutes directory information retained by the school corporation and subject to limited distribution: name, address, telephone number, height, weight, sex, race, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, honor rolls, class projects with student recognition, scholarships, school and corporation newsletters and corporation website. If the parent or eligible student (18 years or older) does not want the above information released, their building principal must be notified in writing by September 10, 2010.
- 7. A copy may be furnished pursuant to a court order or subpoena, but only if the parents are given advance notice.
- 8. The parent has a right to have a record corrected if it is inaccurate, misleading or is otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of the students.


High School News THEATERFEST

For the eighth year in a row, German III and IV students participated in the Theaterfest, sponsored and hosted by Valparaiso University.

At the Theaterfest, students showcase their theatrical and German skills, meet German students from other high schools, and have a glimpse into what university-level German students are like. In preparation for the event Hebron students adapted or composed scripts, which were to be performed exclusively in the German language. Hours of rehearsal prepared the students to compete against students from other Northwest Indiana high schools. Each school can enter up to three skits which last from ten to fifteen minutes. Awards are given in two categories: intermediate students (German II - III) and advanced students (German IV - V). After the performance, the university provided a lunch, and the students had the opportunity to visit the Kade-Duesenberg German House and Cultural Center.

Over the years Hebron students have fared well in the competition. This year's classes have kept the tradition alive by bringing home a second place plaque. "We really worked hard to prepare, we had to memorize our lines and then learn to speak them instead of just reciting them" reported Anna Loosemore, a Hebron High School junior. "It was fun being on stage. It helped us with our German by forcing us to speak conversationally. I look forward to doing it again,"

Out with the old...the Indiana State Standards, and in with the new... Common Core Standards! Hebron schools will embrace the Common Core Standards this year. For many years, every state had its own set of academic standards, but now,

it is time to act globally. All students must be ready to compete with students around the world, not just in the next state. Today's jobs require different skills. For most young people, a high school diploma is not enough for a good job. The Common Core Standards are aligned with college and work expectations to prepare students for success in academic college courses (2-and 4-year postsecondary institutions) and to prepare students for success in careers that offer competitive livable salaries above the poverty line, and opportunities for career advancement. The Common Core Standards are fewer, clearer, and higher; they are aligned with college and work expectations, and include rigorous content and the application of knowledge through higher order skills. The Common Core Standards build upon the strengths and lessons of current state standards, evidence-and/or research based practices, realistic and practical strategies for the classroom. They provide consistency across all states and are informed by top performing countries (Belgium, Canada, China, England, Finland, Hong Kong, Australia, Ireland, Singapore) AND...do you remember when the United States was listed among the top performing countries? It is time; it has been time for the United States to join the list of top performing schools again.

We will be asking for more from your children this year! EVERY child should be making one-year of academic progress per year. And, it is our job to make sure that happens, but we can't do it alone! We need the support of every parent in this community. School has to be the priority. Students must be in school. Homework has to be completed and turned in. Textbooks, pencils, pens, calculators, and assignments must be carried to the classroom!

We are excited to start the year with some engaging opportunities for students. In science, students will have the opportunity to use IPADS to enrich instruction. Elementary School News

The 2011-2012 school year is just around the corner! Hopefully, everyone is excited to begin a new school year. One new mandate from the Indiana Department of Education is the submission of an Elementary Reading Plan. Their

intent is to ensure all students become proficient readers by the end of third grade and find future success through literacy. One of the requirements of this plan is to ensure that elementary schools offer reading instruction in a dedicated, uninterrupted minimum 90-minute block of time daily to students in kindergarten through third grade. The reading block will include whole-group instruction utilizing a core reading program and small-group differentiated instruction to meet individual student needs. Schools with half-day kindergarten programs must ensure 90 minutes of reading instruction are provided daily, but they do not have to be uninterrupted. Our K-3 teachers will be very protective of that 90 minute reading block and will want to make sure parents understand that students need to be on time in the morning and that parents are avoiding pulling students out for appointments during that time.

Over the summer, we are also upgrading in the area of technology. Every classroom will have a projector and mimeo installed when the teachers return in August. They will be able to run internet through their projector and do whiteboard activities to enhance their instruction. We are also purchasing new computers for the labs and the current lab machines will be placed in pods in each classroom. Teachers will receive training in the Fall to help them use the new technology effectively.

We would also like to introduce two new staff members for the 2011-2012 school year. Elizabeth Levrio will be a new 5th grade teacher. Miss Levrio was our Response To Instruction (RTI) teacher last year. Miss Levrio was a graduate of Chesterton High School and Purdue University. Brandy Tolley will be our new Response To Instruction (RTI) teacher. Miss Tolley was a graduate of Hebron High School and Purdue University. We would like to welcome both of them to Hebron Elementary School!

We will see you on our first day of school on August 24th!

No Child Left Behind Notice to Parents | Professional Qualifications of Teachers

As a parent/guardian of a student of the MSD Boone Twp., you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain information about your child's classroom teachers, and requires us to give you this information in a timely manner. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- 1. Whether the Indiana Department of Education has licensed or gualified the teacher for the grades and/or subjects he or she teaches.
- 2. The teacher's college major, whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of these degrees.
- 3. Whether the Indiana Department of Education ruled that a teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulation because of special circumstances.
- 4. Whether any teacher's aids provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.



Registration Process

- 1. A parent/guardian is required to be present to register his/her child(ren).
- An information/emergency form needs to be updated and a nursing information form filled out and signed by each student. Please include the student's Social Security number, parent's e-mail address, cell phone number and at least one local emergency contact other than the parent(s) listed.
- 3. Book rental fees are expected to be paid in full and a contract stating payment due dates must be signed. If you are planning on applying for the free or reduced lunch program, this needs to be done at registration.
- 4. You also will have the opportunity to add money to existing lunch accounts, purchase sports passes and pay class dues.

PERMISSION TO DRIVE

Driving motorized vehicles to school will be permitted providing:

- 1. The student must follow all school regulations when operating a motor vehicle on school property.
 - A. Once parked on school property, the vehicle is not to be entered until the student is ready to leave school grounds for the day.B. Speed must be **10 MPH** on school property.
- 2. The school will not be responsible for damages to vehicles on the school grounds.
- 3. IMPLIED CONSENT is granted to school officials to search a vehicle on school property for contraband, drugs, or any stolen items. The use of automobiles by students for transportation purposes to and from school is **a privilege not a right.** This privilege is not to be abused by using an automobile in any way that would cause, or could reasonably be foreseen to cause an interference with school purposes or educational functions, which is forbidden by state law or school rules. The school corporation retains the right to inspect any automobile and its contents to insure the vehicle's use is in accordance with its intended purpose. An authorized school official may inspect any automobile without a warrant if there is a reasonable belief that the student responsible for the vehicle has violated or is violating school policy.
- 4. P.L. 121 Driving Privileges Altered by Attendance, Suspension or Expulsion:
 - A. 13-15 year olds must not be habitually truant or they will not be authorized to receive a license until the age of 18 or over.
 - B. Suspensions: If suspended twice, the student's license will be withdrawn or not allowed.
 - C. Expulsion means the license is withdrawn until after the age of 18 has been reached.
- 5. There is a \$5 registration fee for first vehicle (\$2/each additional) tag issued. There will be a \$10 fine on cars without a tag after due date and/or the car will be towed at the owner's expense.

School officials may revoke driving privileges of a student if school rules are not adhered to.
